On a sunny Saturday morning, Mobile Health Clinic driver Rosa Hurtado is out early, doing safety checks on the vehicle and prepping the exam rooms for the day. She drives the 40-foot clinic to Village Community Resource Center in Brentwood, and rolls it into place right in front of the organization's doors. A group of about ten people are already waiting outside on folding chairs, or in cars. She sets up the staircase and handrails leading to the clinic door, which will open at 9 a.m.


The medical staff, including volunteer physicians, nurses, and Family Medicine residents, arrive and prepare for a busy morning, not knowing what the day will bring.

"Our door serves as a portal to health care for a very important sector of our community," says Kishore Nath, MD, Medical Director of the Mobile Health Clinic. "It allows us to see patients who fall in between: those who work hard and make just enough money not to qualify for Medi-Cal, but not enough to buy health insurance.



Other patients are uninsurable. We've been able to capture patients who are getting squeezed out on the margins. The reality is, if we are not out here seeing patients and identifying chronic diseases that can be easily managed in early stages, these patients are going to end up in the emergency room and in our hospitals for avoidable visits." Services are provided by John Muir Health Family Medicine Resident physicians, volunteer doctors, nurses and medical professionals.

The Mobile Health Clinic increases access to preventative and medical healthcare services for the low-income, uninsured and under-insured population of Contra Costa County.

Two Decades of Mobile Care

Since 2001, John Muir Health's Mobile Health Clinic has been on the road throughout the Contra Costa County, going where the need is great-Brentwood, Concord, Pittsburg, Richmond. The Clinic on wheels is a partnership effort with Contra Costa County's Healthcare for the Homeless Program, RotaCare Bay Area, and nonprofit organizations where the vehicle parks and offers services. The mutual goal-to increase access to preventive and medical health care services for low-income. uninsured and under-insured individuals, with specific attention to addressing the social determinants of health.

Kirsten Rigsby, the Executive Director of the Village Community Resource Center reflects on the

positive progress, "prior to the Mobile Health Clinic, there was little to no access to healthcare in far East Contra Costa County for those who could not afford services. And, since 2001, John Muir Health has provided such an invaluable resource to our community."

Catherine Owen, MD, one of John Muir Health's original volunteer physicians for the Mobile Health Clinic since 2001, observes that community-based healthcare services are critical. "Every healthcare system should offer a gift like this to the community. For these two decades of service, this is one of John Muir Health's gifts to the community."

Working in Partnership

As a not-for-profit health system, John Muir Health has long been committed to our partnerships that provide lasting impact for the communities we serve. John Muir Health continually evaluates how to adapt to the community need by potentially driving to new locations. Maynor Guerra, a Mobile Health Clinic driver of 19 years, remains inspired knowing that "we are helping the communities that are deeply in need and by being mobile, we are able to bring the services directly to families near where they live."

The Mobile Health Clinic served more than 8,000 patients during Saturday Clinic and over 28,000 patients through partnerships with Concord RotaCare and Contra Costa County Healthcare for the Homeless.

At St. Vincent de Paul in Pittsburg, the Executive Director. Claudia Ramirez, stands outside her facility, watching the first patients step into the Mobile Health Clinic. "John Muir Health serves the population here in a variety of ways. The Mobile Health Clinic and other outreach efforts that John Muir Health is doing are a great service, including participating with our Pittsburg RotaCare free clinic, and having resident physicians from the John Muir Health Family Medicine Residency Program conduct a six-week rotation with us. They also work with Rotary clubs that help fund our clinic. Staff on the vehicle interact with our clients. many of whom are homeless. and everyone is treated with dignity, with respect and with

caring. We're privileged to partner together."

In Pittsburg, one of the groups waiting on folding chairs is a couple with a young daughter. The mom, Patricia, is concerned about a rash developing on her daughter's neck. "It's awesome to have something like this (clinic). Hopefully, they can tell me what's wrong. Otherwise, I wouldn't know where to go." When it's their turn, Patricia watches while the nurse takes vitals and examines her daughter, who then sees one of the physicians. Soon, they have a diagnosis, instructions, and medication. With a visible sense of relief, Patricia and her daughter leave hand-in-hand, waving and calling out thank-you's.

Meet our Residents

Between patients, Adia Scrubb, MD, MPP who is part of the first cohort of Family Medicine Residency physicians to serve on the clinic, reflects on this year. "It's extra rewarding to work here, knowing you may have saved a patient a terrible trip to the Emergency Room. One patient with high blood pressure hugged me—saying 'I feel so much better!' In this case, just a small change in her medication set up a better trajectory for her health."

She adds, "Our screenings, like mammograms, or diagnosis of pregnancy, can lead to very important follow-up, such as prenatal care. Basic blood work can unravel critical diagnoses, such as anemias, and we can detect hypertension. In addition, we can see an entire family, across age ranges. The quality of care is John Muir Health-level excellent."

Gabe Saleh. MD. another resident. comments: "Working here is tremendous in terms of reaching a population we might not otherwise see. I started out wanting to do primary care. Now, I want to continue this work, in outreach to those who most need us, and focus on urgent care and emergency response." Dr. Saleh grew up in Martinez and Antioch, and says, "bringing the Family Medicine Residents here shows that John Muir Health is really a part of this community. This is home."

According to Dr. Nath, who also teaches in the Residency program, "We've been able to accomplish a lot through the Mobile Health Clinic, not only in terms of service -we see 500 to 600 patients a year in this clinic alone-but we've also conducted research projects, provided health education at community organizations and lead multiple service projects in under-resourced communities. Now, we know how to serve in disaster situations and emergency situations, and we've been able to get patients more access to care at our own Family Medicine Residency Clinic. Residents learn how to do hands-on procedures. They're going to be the doctors who continue to see patients in our community."



A Nurse's Viewpoint

Another perspective comes from the Mobile Health Clinic's nurse, Isis Morales, LVN. "I love this population," she says. "Wherever there's a need, we go. As an immigrant myself, I know how my parents struggled, and I see the needs in this community."

"People see us and wonder, is it a van? A camper? They are surprised that it's a full medical clinic with two exam rooms, offering free health care. We can do lab work, and if results are borderline, we provide education, show how important a patient's numbers are (such as blood pressure and cholesterol) and print out diets. We see the difference when they come back. We see patients get healthier and they are very thankful. If there's something we can't do, we find a resource for the patient, such as the Monument

Crisis Center, a homeless shelter, or senior center—and we do warm handoffs."

She notes that since 2018, John Muir Health has partnered with Fred Finch Youth and Family Services to offer free, confidential, bilingual English-Spanish mental health counseling for individuals and families. Sessions are held on Saturdays, while the Mobile Health Clinic is there.

"It's really incredible that John Muir Health offers this whole program. This is team-based quality care, and it's an amazing team. At the end of the day, I feel so good that we have reached so many people. It used to be six patients, now sometimes fourteen, and once twenty-two! It's such a rewarding feeling for anyone to come and see the help we're giving to this population."



A New Vehicle Debuts

July 2019, a new high-tech mobile clinic hit the road, with updated equipment, more space, and state of the art mechanics. "It's a really big improvement," says driver Rosa Hurtado. "It's easier to drive than a regular car, and so much more functional and up to date."

Hurtado says that over the years, she has also watched the need for clinic services grow. "Due to immigration concerns, some patients are afraid. Here, they trust us and feel secure. Coming to the mobile clinic is so much more inviting, warm, safe, secure, and culturally competent." Driver Saul Garcia takes pride in his role where he sees the impact of the work first hand. Garcia is a native Spanish speaker and is honored "when I get called in to help translate between the doctor and the patient, or the patient and the nurse, however my help is needed."

Collectively, three drivers have worked for the Mobile Health Clinic for 40-plus years. They drive, maintain the truck, and during clinic hours, they also serve as translators. What the Mobile Health Clinic does is make health care delivery more efficient, economical and frankly more compassionate, and I think that's what a lot of people at John Muir Health are about—delivering high-quality compassionate care. It's our mission.

The Mobile Health Clinic is one very important way we deliver on that.

Health Professions Education

Workforce Development

John Muir Health supports health professional training and education across our healthcare system. Each year, we offer hundreds of physician, nurse, imaging, lab, pharmacy and other training opportunities. The Family Medicine Residency Program, in its third year, trained 24 medical residents, which included a rotation on Vulnerable Population Health.

Research

John Muir Health supports research studies that are available for participation by community members who qualify. In 2019, John Muir Health contributed **\$567,913** in government-funded clinical and other research studies.

In total for 2019, **1,297** health professionals were trained during residencies, internships and fellowships, for a Community Benefit of **\$5,004,225**.


